COMMUNITY SUPPORT

In March, several GreyStone Power employees took the day to give of their time assisting a local organization, the Warehouse of Hope (WOH), which is supported by Operation Round Up through the GreyStone Power Foundation, Inc.

Located at 100 Hunter Road in Paulding County, the WOH is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit food and clothing ministry, which was founded in 1994. More than 600-800 families in need visit the facility during a typical week to help meet their needs.

During the summer, WOH also partners with MUST Ministries to provide around 300 lunches to children, while also assisting the Paulding County School System with their Backpack Program. Through the donations that are received, they have even been able to assist Paulding Pregnancy and a local homeless ministry.


While volunteering, the GreyStone Gives team sorted clothing, stocked food shelves and portioned out rice. The team prepared 500 pounds of rice in just two hours, which normally takes the WOH four days to complete.

Through our GreyStone Gives program, each employee is allowed eight hours a year to volunteer with an approved 501(c)(3) organization.

Retired board director passes away

Ed Garrard of Powder Springs, Ga., was a man of many hats and beloved stories. He served in the U.S. Army Air Forces from 1943 to 1946, and was recommended for the Bronze Star for Meritorious Performance of Duty. He was a graduate of Atlanta Law School and owned his own real estate company, Garrard Realty, for 60 years.

Garrard also served as a Georgia state senator from 1967 until 1976. But it is the 18 years he served District 9 (Cobb County) as a member of the Board of Directors for GreyStone Power for which we know him best. Garrard passed away on March 28, 2019, at the age of 95. Survivors include three children, six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

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ne of the seven cooperative principles is education, training and information, and electric cooperatives like GreyStone Power can often be found in the community sharing knowledge that benefits their members.

GreyStone employees visit schools in the co-op's service area throughout the year to teach children about electricity, safety and career opportunities. GreyStone's Director of Safety and Loss Control Jarred Stevens visited North Douglas Elementary School in the spring, where he gave about 10 Safety City presentations to students alongside Lead Lineman Jared Childers.

Safety City is an interactive display that demonstrates the dangers of electricity using real-life scenarios.

"These scenarios are relatable to most kids, which initially grabs their attention. Next, we show them what can potentially happen inside each scenario. When they see and hear the electrical arcs and fires, their eyes really light up and the gears start spinning in their heads. It really gets them thinking, asking questions and learning about the real dangers of electricity," says Stevens. One of the biggest dangers children face when it comes to electricity, Stevens says, is not understanding how dangerous it can be.

"Electricity is different than most other hazards in that many times you cannot see it or hear it. By the time you realize you have made a mistake, it is too late. Children are naturally curious. When it comes to electricity, this curiosity should be studied through questions with professionals, not through personal exploration," he adds.

GreyStone's company-wide safety program encourages employees to look for and report hazards, and Stevens says he hopes to create that same awareness with children who see the Safety City presentation. He encourages students to always be observant.

"Look around and try to think about potential hazards. If you see a hazard, speak up!" he tells them. For anyone encountering a downed power line, Stevens says to assume it is energized and dangerous. "Stay as far away as possible and call 911. Only an experienced lineman has the training necessary to determine if a downed line is safe to be around."

Stevens' background as a former lineman helped prepare him for his current role.

"I was fortunate enough to learn the trade from some of the best linemen. I was taught from day one that the right way to do the job is the safe way, and the only way, to do the job. I have seen firsthand the hazards that are associated with the work and understand how important safety truly is," he says.

During the visit to North Douglas, students also had the chance to participate in a touch-a-truck experience with GreyStone's linemen. This experience educates children on the importance of personal protective equipment (PPE) for lineworkers.

"The touch-a-truck allows children to get their hands on some of the tools and equipment that we use every day. It is almost like they are playing in the land of giants because everything we use is so big and heavy. It really gets them engaged. I love watching their faces when they try on our rubber gloves and their arms just disappear inside them," says Stevens.

Another important aspect of the school visits is educating students about career opportunities in the electric utility industry.

"My favorite topic to discuss is how rewarding a career as a lineman can be," Stevens says.

"During storm restoration efforts, communities who have lost everything truly rally behind linemen. These communities come together and show an overwhelming amount of love and support to the men and women who are working to put their lives back together, pole by pole. It is so humbling and rewarding to see such love and support in these times of devastation," he adds.

Stevens says the industry is constantly growing, and the demand for linemen and related fields is high.

HOW TO BECOME A CANDIDATE

Eligible members may become a candidate by being selected by the GreyStone Nominating Committee, or by nomination by petition of members. While incumbents David Hagenow, District 3; Billy Mayhew, District 5; and Lucy Andres, District 9, have been nominated by the Nominating Committee, eligible members may still run by petition.

An eligible member may be nominated by submitting a petition signed by 50 or more GreyStone members of record (the name must appear on the electric bill). The petition, along with a Candidate Affidavit, must be submitted by Thursday, July 4. Petition and affidavit can be found at *greystonepower.com/boardelections*.

All nominees are subject to a criminal background check, must live within the geographic boundary of the district they seek to represent and must meet all other conditions of eligibility.

MOVE OVER, CHEER THEM ON

We love our linemen, and we need our members' help in keeping them safe when they are out working in the community, especially as they work along roadways.

Georgia's Move Over law requires drivers to move over one lane, if possible, when a utility vehicle is stopped on the shoulder of the highway. If traffic is too heavy to move over safely, the law requires drivers to slow down below the posted speed limit instead and be prepared to stop.

Along with utility vehicles, the law also applies to first responders (law enforcement, fire, EMS), DOT vehicles, HERO units and wreckers tending to an accident.

Reports show emergency vehicles of all types have been struck while parked beside Georgia highways, even while their emergency lights were flashing. The fine for not complying with Georgia's Move Over law can be up to \$500.

Another way to show your support for linemen is by purchasing a Thank a Lineman vehicle license plate when renewing your annual motor vehicle registration. Proceeds benefit the Burn Foundation of America, which provides assistance to burn patients and their families at the Joseph M. Still Burn Center at Doctor's Hospital in Augusta.

GreyStone members who would like to support our linemen in person can even cheer them on each year as they compete at the Georgia Lineman's Rodeo. In May, teams of linemen convene in Perry, Georgia, to show their skills and compete against other utilities in timed events. The rodeo helps to reinforce safe work practices in the electric utility industry while promoting relationships among companies and linemen in the Southeast.

Teams that excel at the Georgia rodeo may go on to compete at the International Lineman's Rodeo, held in October in Kansas. This rodeo attracts the best linemen from around the world to compete in events based on traditional lineman tasks and skills. A team of GreyStone linemen became world champions in 2012, after they earned first place overall in competition with 205 teams of linemen from around the world.

Also in October, members have the chance to thank a lineman in person at our Annual Meeting of Members, held the second Saturday in October every year. At this year's event on Oct. 12, children can see what it's like to wear a lineman's gloves while being in a stationary "bucket," such as the ones you would find on a bucket truck. Adults can also participate in this fun photo opportunity.

Whether you're cheering on our linemen at a rodeo competition or keeping an eye out for them during your daily commute, we hope members will support these dedicated professionals.
