Commercial members, YOU have the power! The Georgia Territorial Electric Service Act of 1973 resulted in the assignment of exclusive power supply areas throughout the state. The Georgia electric membership cooperatives were assigned 71% of the state's land area, but there are exceptions to these assignments that offer some new customers/members the choice of their power supplier, regardless of the assigned territory. Once a commercial member chooses a power supplier, that commitment is made for the lifetime of the facility to be served.

GreyStone Power was recently selected as the provider of electric service for Harmony at Douglasville, an assisted living community.

CONSIDERATIO IS ROOFTOP SOLAR RIGHT FOR YOU?

SELL POWER BACK TO GREYSTONE

Call us at 770-370-2042 to learn about GreyStone's buyback policy and rate. While it's possible for your rooftop solar system to generate more electricity than your household used, it's typically not economical to invest in a larger system than you need.

DISCONNECT FROM THE GRID

Unless you have a rooftop solar and battery storage system large enough to meet all of your electricity needs during every hour of the day, GreyStone will still be providing you with electricity at night and on cloudy days. The use of battery storage can help meet your electricity needs; however, it will add a significant expense to your total system cost.

Have you considered energy efficiency improvements you can make to your home?

YES

Great! By making your home more energy efficient, you've likely reduced your electricity use. Be sure to contact GreyStone to understand your current electricity use so you and your solar installer can size a rooftop solar installation to best meet your electricity needs and financial objectives.

NO

You should consider energy efficiency improvements, such as using energy-saving LED lightbulbs or installing a smart thermostat. Making your home more energy efficient will help reduce your electricity use while also lowering your electricity costs. As a result, you'll also reduce the size needed and total cost of a rooftop solar system.

Does your roof face south?

Outstanding! A south-facing roof orientation with minimal shading offers the greatest solar energy potential.

NO

While a south-facing roof is the most ideal orientation for rooftop solar, homes that face other directions will still produce electricity, just not as much. With GreyStone's Cooperative Solar program, you can subscribe to receive electricity from off-site solar facilities that are constructed in the most ideal conditions to maximize their solar energy output.

Is your roof free of shade from trees or nearby structures?

YES

Great! Your solar energy potential is higher with no shading or sunlight obstructions.

NO

Solar panels perform best with direct sunlight. Obstructions that block direct sunlight, such as trees or nearby structures, will limit solar energy production. With GreyStone's Cooperative Solar program, you can subscribe to receive energy from off-site solar facilities that are constructed in the most ideal conditions, in open land areas with no shading.

Is your roof less than five years old?

YES

Excellent! Installing a rooftop solar system on a roof less than five years old is ideal because of the potential long life of solar panels.

NO

Your roof should be less than five years old to avoid costly removal or replacement of rooftop solar panels during roof repairs. With GreyStone's Cooperative Solar program, you can subscribe to receive energy from off-site solar facilities, eliminating concerns about the age and condition of your roof.

Do you own your home?

YES

Great! You have a few options for solar energy, including a rooftop solar system and GreyStone's Cooperative Solar program.

NO

With GreyStone's Cooperative Solar program, you can still take advantage of the benefits of solar energy without having to gain approval from the homeowner and your neighborhood homeowners association.

Three seats on the GreyStone Board of Directors are up for election in 2022. The winners will be announced Saturday, Oct. 8, at the Annual Meeting of Members.

HOW TO BECOME A CANDIDATE

Eligible members may become a candidate by being selected by the GreyStone Nominating Committee or by nomination by petition of members. Directors seeking re-election this year are David Hagenow in District 3 and Billy Mayhew in District 5. The board solicited candidates to apply to fill an upcoming vacancy in District 9. Director Lucy Andres plans to retire from the board when her term ends on Oct. 8.

The deadline has passed to be nominated by the Nominating Committee, but eliqible members may still run by petition. An eligible member may be nominated by submitting a petition signed by 50 or more GreyStone members of record (the name must appear on the electric bill). The petition, along with a Candidate Affidavit, must be submitted by Thursday. June 30. Forms for petitions and the affidavit can be found at greystonepower.com/board-elections.

NOMINEE REQUIREMENTS

All nominees are subject to a criminal and financial background check, must live within the geographic boundary of the district they seek to represent, have no more than three late payments in the last two years and must meet all other conditions of eligibility.

Candidates desiring to have their name and biographical information included in the Annual Meeting ballot edition of Georgia Magazine must submit information in the format and manner required by the Credentials and Elections Committee by Thursday, June 30. If you are unable to determine the district in which you reside, or need additional information, call GreyStone's independent legal counsel, Steve Minor, at 770-214-5108.

EFFICIENCY 101

Ceiling fan


If you are like most Americans, you have at least one ceiling fan in your home. Ceiling fans help our indoor life feel more comfortable. They are a decorative addition to our homes and, if used properly, can help lower energy costs.

Most ceiling fans have a switch near the blades. In warm months, flip the switch so that the blades operate in a counterclockwise direction, effectively producing a "wind chill" effect. Fans make the air near them feel cooler than it actually is. Regardless of the season, try operating the fan on its lowest setting.

In the summer, when using a fan in conjunction with an air conditioner, or instead of it, you can turn your thermostat up 3 to 5 degrees without any reduction in comfort. This saves money since a fan is less costly to run than an air conditioner.

Make sure your ceiling fan is the right size for the room. A fan that is 36-44 inches in diameter will cool rooms up to 225 square feet. A fan that is 52 inches or more should be used to cool a larger space.

When the room is unoccupied, turn the fan off. Fans are intended to cool people-not rooms.




New virtual agent

Local nonprofit impacted by GreyStone grant

CONCERN FOR COMMUNITY

For Tara Nichols, Making Life Better isn't just the mission of GreyStone Power. It's the reality of her nonprofit organization, the Nichols Center, made possible by receiving a grant from the GreyStone Power Foundation, Inc.

The Nichols Center is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that provides mental health services to Douglas County and surrounding areas. In 2022, the Nichols Center launched their Guardians Program, which is a monthly veteran and first responder support group that includes online suicide intervention training and a monthly first responder breakfast.

"Our goal is to develop a meaningful relationship that provides educational awareness and training to our first responders," says Nichols. "This allows them to connect with resources and have the awareness to provide a peer-to-peer response in times of crisis."

With the support from the GreyStone Power Foundation, Inc., the Nichols Center can expand the Guardians Program in multiple ways. They will be able to expand their comprehensive six-hour peer-to-peer suicide intervention training to all firefighters in Douglas County, as well as continue their monthly first responder breakfast. They will also collect donations for a monthly station stock program that allows the community to provide edible goodies to every fire station.

The Nichols Center will also be building a Guardian's Shed that will be a peer-to-peer, project-oriented connection point for first responders and other at-risk community members. Nichols says that many first responders struggle with reaching out for support in times of crisis, and the Guardian's Shed will allow them a safe place to meet one-on-one with individuals who walk a similar journey.

"With the help of GreyStone Power, we will be able to continue this great work and fill this gap in our community," says Nichols.

The GreyStone Power Foundation, Inc. is built upon the strength of GreyStone's members volunteering to round up their electric bills to the next dollar to provide monetary assistance for nonprofit organizations. It makes a tremendous difference in the lives of those who need help in our community.
