The GreyStone Power Foundation, Inc. Scholarship, which is funded by members who donate to Operation Round Up[®], was awarded recently to five students in the cooperative's service area. Winners of the \$3,000 scholarships included students Gracie Price, Sara Tilley, Raylee Johnson, Lucas Merritt and Landon Hall.

The scholarships are given based on academic performance as well as school and community activities and are made possible by GreyStone members who agree to round up their electric bills to the next dollar. The cost per month to assist worthy students like these, as well as charitable organizations throughout the service area, is no more than 99 cents per month for participating members.

Gracie Price graduated from Whitefield Academy and will attend the University of Alabama to study performance arts and business. Sara Tilley graduated from East Paulding High School and will attend Jacksonville State to study forensics. Raylee Johnson graduated from Praise Academy and will attend Shorter University to study elementary education. Lucas Merritt graduated from Trinity Center for Independent Studies and was dual enrolled at Truett McConnell. He will attend Kennesaw State University to study mechanical engineering. Landon Hall graduated from East Paulding High School and will attend Savannah College of Arts and Design to study game development.

"We are so grateful to our 27,000 members who contribute to Operation Round Up, the foundation's fundraising program, so that we can recognize worthy students such as these, as well as help those who need help in our community," says Marcus Carter, chairman of the foundation board.

Capital credits checks are arriving!

Capital credits are a unique feature of cooperatives. Margins above the cost of doing business are returned to members annually. The amount of your check is determined by your energy use. GreyStone has returned \$169.6 million in capital returns to members since 1936. It's the cooperative difference!

One of the guiding principles of GreyStone Power is giving back to the communities we serve. This supports the cooperative principle of Concern for Community and is at the heart of everything that GreyStone does.

In the summer of 2018, the co-op expanded on that principle by creating GreyStone Gives, an employee community service initiative. The program allows GreyStone employees eight hours a year to volunteer with a 501(c)(3) charitable organization within its service area. Employees can volunteer on their own or through group coordinated events offered throughout the year.

"GreyStone Gives was an effort to expand GreyStone's commitment to the community we serve by allowing every employee an opportunity to serve in the community," says Rita Wilson, human resources manager at GreyStone. "Prior to this initiative, it was mostly the members of the Senior/Extended Leadership teams that served the community by sitting on various boards throughout our service area."

So far this year, GreyStone employees have collected school supplies for the Douglas County School System's school supply donation drive and helped clean up, paint and pressure-wash one of the S.H.A.R.E. House facilities. According to GreyStone Gives volunteer and member services representative Ana Ventura, the program not only benefits the community, but also the employees who volunteer.

> "GreyStone Gives helps create inclusion and build strong community bonds," Ventura says. "I enjoy the opportunity to learn valuable skills, get closer to co-workers and meet new people."

BOARD CANDIDATES

Each year, members elect three of the nine directors who serve on GreyStone Power's Board of Directors. Each member may vote for a candidate from each district. Incumbents seeking re-election this year include David Hagenow and Billy Mayhew. Following Lucy Andres' retirement from the board, the Nominating Committee solicited applications from all members who reside in District 9. Numerous applications were submitted, and after interviewing five of the applicants, the Nominating Committee selected Charisse Braxton as its sole nominee for the position. Because no members were nominated by petition, there will be no contested election this year. Therefore, the election will be conducted by voice vote at the Annual Meeting on Saturday, Oct. 8.



David Hagenow District 3 Douglas and Paulding counties

David Hagenow is retired from IBM with nearly three decades of financial planning and accounting experience. Prior to retirement, Hagenow created, measured and reported on expense and resource budgets

for IBM Global, worked as team lead/forecast coordinator for North America IBM and has certification in Certified Management Accounting. A veteran of the U.S. Army, Hagenow served for 3¹/₂ years with training in power generation. He graduated from Western Illinois University with a Bachelor of Science degree and earned a Master of Accountancy degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Hagenow has earned the Director Gold certification, as well as the Credentialed Cooperative Director Certificate and the Board Leadership Certificate from the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA). Hagenow has been serving on the board since 2016 and currently serves as secretary-treasurer.

"My desire is to help GreyStone Power balance outstanding service with affordable rates for all members. In addition, I will use my background in financial planning and analysis to help ensure the cooperative makes good strategic, fiscal decisions," he says.



Billy Mayhew District 5 Carroll and Douglas counties

Billy F. Mayhew is market executive senior vice president with ServisFirst Bank in Douglasville. He formerly worked for Douglas County Bank from 1980 until 2013, serving as bank president and

CEO for 28 years. He is a graduate of University of West Georgia. Mayhew was a founding board member of the Douglas County Boys Club in 1982, now the Douglas County Boys & Girls Club, and was awarded the Boys & Girls Club Lifetime Achievement Award in December 2003. He has also served on the boards of the Douglas County Chamber of Commerce, the WellStar Regional Board, the Douglas County Regional Youth Shelter, Community Bankers of Georgia and PRC Medical of Douglas County. He is currently chairman of the Hospital Authority of Douglas County.

Having earned the Credentialed Cooperative Director Certificate from the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA), Mayhew is working toward his Board Leadership certification. Since joining the GreyStone Power Board of Directors in 2018, he has served on the Finance Committee and currently serves on the Policy, Public and Employee Relations Committee.

"It is a true honor to serve on the GreyStone Power Board," he says. "My focus is to represent co-op members by maintaining low rates and excellent service."



Charisse Braxton District 9 Cobb County

Charisse Braxton currently serves as senior director of clinical operations at Kaiser Permanente, a nationally renowned health care organization. She also serves on the alumni advisory board

for Byrdine F. Lewis College of Nursing and Health Professions at Georgia State University (GSU).

Braxton has over 30 years of experience in health care, from her role as a registered nurse to a leader in health care administration. She graduated from SUNY Downstate in Brooklyn, New York, with a Bachelor of Science in nursing. She earned her Master of Science at GSU, becoming nationally certified as a Family Nurse Practitioner, and completed the MBA/MHA program at GSU's J. Mack Robinson College of Business. She holds a Green Belt in Lean Six Sigma for process improvement. Braxton also served as chairwoman of the Clayton County Chamber of Commerce in 2021 and is the immediate past chair on the Clayton County Chamber of Commerce executive board.

EFFICIENCY 101 Water heater REBATES

Some residential members may be interested in converting gas water heaters and furnaces to electric due to rising costs of natural gas and propane. GreyStone has two rebates available for members who convert from gas to electric.

If the requirements are met, the member becomes eligible for either a \$200 or \$400 rebate after converting a water heater from gas to electric. Also, members become eligible for either a \$300 (not Energy Star-rated) or \$600 (Energy Star-rated) rebate when changing from gas heat to an electric heat pump or dual fuel.

Members can also receive a rebate for replacing their propane water heater with an electric one. Members can be eligible for: a rebate of \$500 for a water heater with a 12-year or better limited warranty, a rebate of \$300 for a water heater with less than a 12-year limited warranty or a rebate of \$500 for a Marathon or heat pump water heater.

It is the member's responsibility to complete these conversions on their own or with the help of outside contractors (GreyStone is not involved in electric conversions). After the conversion is completed, a residential energy consultant will inspect the conversion to ensure that all requirements are completed. At that point the rebate will be processed for the member. Visit *greystonepower.com/rebates* to learn more.
