A vision cast 50 years ago still burns

In 1965, with a suitcase packed full of clothes and dreams, 12 Georgia students embarked on an adventure of a lifetime. Little did they know that they would be blazing a trail for thousands more students to follow in their footsteps over the next 50 years.

With only three Georgia electric cooperatives participating on this inaugural trip, the winning teens were awarded an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., so they could gain a better understanding of American history and their role as citizens. Today, 38 cooperatives around the state participate in the Washington Youth Tour (WYT) by sponsoring students from schools within their service areas.

The inaugural Georgia group left Savannah, traveling by train, and met up with nearly 600 students from 17 states in the nation's capital. They had the opportunity to meet with U.S. senators and representatives, visited historic places, toured the Capitol and cruised with delegates from around the country on the Potomac River. The highlight of their trip was a special invitation from President Lyndon Johnson to a Rose Garden reception at the White House.

It was former President Johnson who first envisioned beginning the WYT in 1957 when he was a senator. He expressed his desire at the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Annual Meeting to "send youngsters to the national capital where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents." In the years that followed, participation slowly grew among the state cooperatives, including Georgia.

Students are given the same his-





torical and leadership opportunities now as the first students who participated. This year, GreyStone Power selected five students to join the nearly 1,700 other teens from 43 states participating in the national event.

GreyStone delegates (as seen below, from left) Alexei Antonovich, of Alexander High School; Cheyenne Tippens, of Alexander High School; Vincent Buckman, of Lithia Springs High School; Jordan Fitzgerald, of Paulding County High School; and Andrew Sheffield, of Landmark Christian School, were among the 111 students representing Georgia.

The Youth Tour is Georgia's oldest leadership program for teens that rewards academic achievement and provides them a backstage pass to America's history at the nation's capital. Students also have the opportunity to step out of their comfort zone by connecting with other student leaders from around the country.

"Sometimes the best experiences in life come when you step out of your comfort zone," shares Andrew Sheffield, one of the five 2015 GreyStone Power delegates. "This experience has shown me what it's like outside of the bubble I live in at school."

Each year, high school juniors are recognized and recommended for WYT by their school counselors based on their exemplary academic achievements and leadership potential. Last spring, 49 students in the GreyStone service area accepted the challenge to test for a chance to become a WYT delegate and travel to Washington, D.C., for a weeklong, all-expenses-paid trip, as well as the opportunity to rediscover themselves.

Not much has changed over the

past 50 years. Today's delegates are given the same opportunity to not only learn lessons in leadership, but also about the electric cooperative movement, American history and how their government works. These students witness our country's history firsthand as they visit national landmarks, tour the nation's capital and museums, and



even talk to their local congressmen.

"The Youth Tour is a trip for the leaders of the community. It's impossible to be surrounded by leaders for a week and not absorb some of their qualities," explains GreyStone delegate Cheyenne Tippens. It has become a primary goal of the WYT to help co-ops promote stonger communities and a stronger nation by giving as many young people as possible the ability to make meaningful, lifelong contributions to their communities.

GreyStone has participated in the WYT program for 49 years. Each year, GreyStone representatives visit participating schools within the service area and present the program to the counselors and the students they have selected as school leaders. Students are given study materials, then asked to test on that material at the GreyStone office. A sense of accomplishment can be seen on the winners' faces as their names are announced at a banquet in their honor.

Today, WYT alumni, prospective participants and others interested in the program can visit the Youth Tour website, www.youthtour.coop, to learn about its history or reconnect with fellow WYT alumni.

Winter safety

It's winter and we are now in typically the coldest month of the year. You can count on your heating system running overtime, increasing your energy costs. Remember that your heating system will run much cleaner and economically if the furnace filter is replaced every four to six weeks in the winter heating season. Check your filter and replace it if needed.

Home safety is important to everyone. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), electric portable space heaters are responsible for more than 21,000 home fires and 1,500 injuries and deaths every year. To that end, the NFPA recommends the tips in the box below.

DIY tips to remember

When shopping for a portable electric space heater, make sure the model you buy has been tested by Underwriters Laboratory or another reputable testing organization.



urn off heaters when you leave the room or go to bed.

Place the heater on a flat, solid surface.

 $\mathsf{K}_{\mathsf{eep}}$ everything that can burn, such as paper and bedding, at least three feet away from the heater.

Keep kids three feet away from space heaters.

 P urchase portable space heaters with an automatic shut-off that activates when the heater tips over.

igsilono not use extension cords with portable space heaters. Plug the cord directly into outlets.

Do not use a portable electric space heater with a damaged cord or plug.

Decades of fond memories

In 1968, at the age of 17, a young high school graduate joined the ranks of many as he entered the working world. Not long after joining Douglas County Electric Membership Corporation (now GreyStone Power) as a groundman, Jerry Tucker was deployed to Vietnam to fight for our country.

After three months in action, Tucker (as he is fondly referred to), was injured when a child playing near his base camp removed a pin from a hand grenade on his pack, resulting in his losing half of his right foot. He experienced a long recovery but was able to go back to work more than a year later. Within three to six months from returning to work, Tucker had learned to climb a pole with his injured foot and was back on the lines. Since that time, his determination and hard work have not only allowed him to climb poles, but also the corporate ladder within the cooperative.

Now, over 47 years later, as supervisor of line construction and maintenance, Tucker recalls fondly all of the changes that have taken place since he first joined the cooperative. "When I first started, we did everything with notes on paper. Now we have computers and automated systems. The addition of

Pinterest Pick

Chicken Pot Pie Soup

Ingredients:

- 2 cups cooked chicken, cubed
- 2 medium potatoes, peeled and cubed 3 tablespoons butter
- 2-3 tablespoons flour
- 1 cmall vellow opion finally chan
- 1 small yellow onion, finely chopped 4 celery ribs, diced
- 4 celery ribs, diced
- 1-10 ounce bag frozen peas
- 3 carrots or 12 mini carrots, chopped 1 ¹/₂ cups heavy cream or half & half
- 4 cups water
- 2¹/₂ tablespoons chicken base
- 4 teaspoons Montreal Steak seasoning Salt and pepper, to taste

Step 1: Bring a large pot of water to

a boil. Once boiling, add potatoes and cook until tender. Strain and set aside.

Step 2: In a large pot, melt butter. Once butter has started to melt, add carrots and cook for 1-2 minutes. Then add onion and celery. Season vegetables with Montreal Steak seasoning and cook until onions are translucent. Add in water and chicken base, bring to a boil. Let it cook over medium heat for 10-15 minutes.

Step 3: In a water bottle or cup with lid, add ½ cup of Half & Half with the flour and shake vigorously. Add in the remainder of the Half & Half to the pot,



then add flour mixture. Add frozen peas, potatoes and cubed chicken. Season with salt and pepper and add an additional 1-2 teaspoons of Montreal Steak seasoning. Let it simmer 30 minutes, until the soup starts to thicken. Remove from heat and cool for 5-10 minutes.
